The day of trial is going to be the second worst day of your life, guaranteed, with strong odds it might be the single worst day of your life. As you walk up to the table labeled "Defendant" it will sink in, if it hasn't already, that "Defendant" means you, and you are the only one placing any betting chips on this particular table. Everyone else in that courtroom is guaranteed that, unless terrorists attack the courthouse, they will go home to their families that night.

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Not too long ago a trainer behind the lines in the People's Republic of Cuyahoga County passed along that the prosecutor up there has taken the position that a concealed carry license in Ohio only allows the carry of a single handgun, based upon the numerous instances of the phrase "a handgun" in our code. "A" handgun clearly refers to the singular.

R.C. 1.43(A) (Rules of Construction, Singular – Plural) states that within the Revised Code the singular includes the plural and the plural includes the singular. A court might want to ignore that statutory interpretation rule based upon anti-gun prejudice, but it is the statutory law in Ohio since 1972.

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A SPECIAL NOTE ON BRANDISHING, SHOOTING TO WOUND, WARNING SHOTS AND SIMILAR HALF-MEASURES. Prosecutors have another term for warning shots: attempted felonious assault, improper discharge of a firearm etc. Shooting someone in the leg rather than center mass is similarly misguided and will not evade serious felony charges. Similarly, pulling out a gun just to "defuse the situation" is a legal non-starter. Do not be tempted to do this. If the gun comes out of the holster, the gun owner had better be justified in immediately employing it fully. There is no such thing as a warning shot or shooting to wound. This will be construed as a miss, bad marksmanship and perhaps even attempted murder.
